A Statement from Bishop LaTrelle Easterling

Save me, God, because the waters have reached my neck! I have sunk into deep mud. My feet can't touch the bottom! I have entered deep water; the flood has swept me up. I am tired of crying. My throat is hoarse. My eyes are exhausted with waiting for my God. -- Psalm 69:1-3 This psalm, this lament, is offered as a communal cry in the wake of metaphorical as well as literal suffering. The psalmist pleads for the innocent to be saved from unjust circumstances. The writer is weary, tired of crying and hoarse from crying out for justice, justice, justice. Yet, the ultimate plea is not for personal retribution, but for public vindication of God's justice. The psalmist does not lose hope, but trusts that God will have the last word.

In the wake of another police shooting, reports of racism and bullying on the campus of American University, and the Washington Post reporting that flyers from the Ku Klux Klan are being distributed from "California to Kansas to New Jersey," Psalm 69 could have been written today. While in each situation the circumstances are different, what is constant is the racism, bias, and disregard for the lives of people of color. This evil has become all too common. How many videos do we need of unarmed men of color being shot in the street before we recognize that immediate action is needed? And, while many argue that we should not question the actions of law enforcement officers who must make split second decisions, the question remains how a terror suspect can be taken into custody with non-life threatening wounds, while a man stranded with a disabled vehicle is tazed and killed.

During our Northeast Jurisdictional Conference in July, delegates adopted a resolution calling for the church to do more to eradicate racism and injustice, and to acknowledge that all lives, including Black lives, matter to God. This Call to Action also admitted that The United Methodist Church has not done enough in this effort. We collectively repented, accepted responsibility, and pledged to take specific action. The resolution calls us to a sense of urgency -- and that sense of urgency is even more tangible and palpable as blood once again stains the street and students don't feel safe on campus. As we are discerning our way forward, we cannot be silent. We cannot wait for yet another board or committee or task force to direct our actions. We must act today, and today is now!

Today we can pray; today we can have conversations in our congregations about race and race relations in our country and communities; today we can engage with our first responders about their approach to community relations; today we can be in conversation with students about feeling safe at school and in their neighborhoods; today we can begin to understand systemic inequities and how we can dismantle them; today we can acknowledge privilege, and use that privilege to confront discrimination; today we can make it known that we will not be silent in the face of hate.

As your new episcopal leader, I am painfully aware that the issue of race and race relations is not an easy conversation. And yet, as brothers and sisters in Christ, we are called to care for one another, and to confront evil in all its forms. Though the work will not be easy, we join the psalmist in knowing that God will have the last word.

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ENCOURAGEMENT AND MOTIVATION

Confidentiality is the corner stone of Stephen Ministry. It is absolutely essential for building safe, healing, caring relationships. Stephen Ministers don't reveal what their care receivers have told them. Not to clergy, not to the Stephen Leaders, not to their spouses or friends and not to other Stephen Ministers.

Why? Because trust is vital for a caring relationship to be effective. Care receivers are experiencing difficulties that leave them feeling very vulnerable. Discussing their innermost feelings is important step in the healing process. But in order to open up and discuss that which is troubling them most, care receivers need complete trust in their Stephen Minister and the assurance that what they say will not be circulated to others and become news for gossip.

This assurance builds trust can and creates a safe place care where care receivers can risk rece revealing their most painful focu issues and problems, ones relationate they might not even Step

discuss with close friends or receiver, rather than the family.

details of what is going on

Confidentiality helps create a relationship that promotes healing and hope. Another aspect of confidentiality is that nobody except the Stephen Minister, the care receiver, and the clergy or Stephen Leader even know that a care receiver has been assigned Stephen Minister. Care receivers, of course, are free to tell others about the relationship and who their Stephen Minister is, but the Stephen Minister never tells. This means a care receiver can choose to have complete anonymity. If he or she doesn't want people to know that they have a Stephen Minister, no one will ever know.

The Stephen Ministry model of supervision is a key element. Supervision, done twice monthly, is vital to Stephen Ministry so that they can provide the best quality care possible to their care receivers. In supervision the focus of discussion is on the relationship between the Stephen Minister and the care

By not revealing a care receiver's name or any significant details, confidentiality maintained, a n d supervision becomes place where Stephen Ministers can support and encourage one another in ministry while provide the best quality care to their care receivers. It is a model that has enabled life ministry

changing ministry to happen in thousands of Stephen Ministry congregations since 1975.

Why all this talk about confidentiality? To build your trust in Stephen Ministry. It is a high quality, care giving ministry that you can count on should you ever have the need.

Confidentiality is the cornerstone of our Stephen Ministry.

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OUTREACH NEWS

Second Pantry. September was the largest attendance at Second Saturday this year. We team with Community Partners "Back to School Celebration" (See Community Partners We served 68 below). families, 152 adults, 137 children which totals 289 persons. This depleted the food pantry. Totals for the Food Pantry for 2016 are: 540 families, 2,442 Individuals. 1,226 adults 1216 children.

Med-Star Montgomery screened for glucose, hypertension, a n d cholesterol and counseled individuals about their tests. Community Ministries representative informed adults about the Gilchrist Health Center and other resources available through the non-profit organization. Volunteers included teens earning SSL hours, Girl Scouts, and a young adult group.

We are most grateful to St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church for the September 11th delivery of more than 150 bags of food collected for their 2nd annual food drive. A caravan that included vans, trucks and cars along with Pastor Kern and a delegation delivered the food to our food pantry. Our shelves now overflow with food. There is a cart for food donations in the narthex and at the top of the stairs to the Social Hall basement. A list of foods for the bag of food will be placed on the carts. A bag grocery cost approximately \$14.00 at

Saturday/Food Aldi's. Please pledge one bag of food per month or the equivalent cost. We will also be collecting additional food with Community for Thanksgiving bags. Last Back to School year, we donated 75

Thanksgiving bags for the community and Millian families. A \$20.00 Giant gift card was placed in each bag for perishable purchases.

School Supplies. Again we would like to thank you for your donations of school supplies. Millian children and youth received backpacks on August 28 filled with the supplies needed for school. The remaining school supplies and backpacks were given to youth that attended the food pantry/Community Partners' Back-to-School celebration. All of the supplies received were given away with the exception of a few pencils. A few late items will be given to Wheaton Woods or Parkland Middle School. There are students starting school each month of the school year that need supplies. Ask kids that you know who are regulars at Millian to tell you about their backpacks. You really did it students returned to school prepared to learn.

There was something for everyone; for adults there were screening for cholesterol, hypertension and glucose, free clothing, and adult coloring. The students made book marks, sand art, coloring, a cookie flag, and received school supplies. There were refreshments for all. Volunteers included a group of six young-adults - Natally Cruz-Castillo, Isela Mattingly, Stephanie Gutierrez-Mangula, Cecilia Solano, Amely Monterroza, and Mariana Carvo; Danielle Alvarado (Linkages to Learning); Betty Bell (Community); Diary Marroquin, and Technician (MedStar Montgomery) and Janet Coffelt, lann Wisor, and Edith Williams (Millian). Last, but not least about 12 energetic teens from Wheaton High School, Loiederman, Argyle, Parkland middle schools.
